Carmenere, Casa Felipe, Central Valley, Chile	£5.25	£6.00	£8.25	£23.95
<i>A grape variety that was for years found to be languishing in the shadows and (quite literally) in amongst the vines of the Merlot grape. It has seen a remarkable rejuvenation. Bursting with wild Autumnal fruits and silky textures, this impressive Carmenere balances fragrant aromas of violets, ripe, velvet fruitiness with supple tannins.</i>

Sparkling & Champagne

- 1 Prosecco, 'Sylvoz', Le Colture, Treviso, Italy** £29.50
- 2 Sparkling Rosé, Le Colture, Treviso, Italy** £29.50
Prosecco is the white grape that gives this wine its name and is grown in the rolling hills between the towns of Valdobbiadene and Conigiano in the province of Treviso in Northern Italy. The Le Colture winery and a cellar make up the large central farmhouse surrounded by vineyards in the village of San Stefano di Valdobbiadene. The 'white' is pale straw in colour that leads to orchard fruit, citrus & floral aromatics and a delicate, fine and refreshing palate whilst their 'Sparkling rosé (produced from Merlot & Chardonnay grapes) is juicy and soft, bursting with fresh and lively fruit with a clean, sherbety length.
- 3 Veuve Clicquot Yellow Label NV Champagne** £60.00
Pleasing to the nose: initially reminiscent of white fruits and raisins, then of vanilla and later of brioche. Note the fine balance between the fruity aromas coming from the grape varieties and the toasty aromas following the ageing in the bottle. The first sip delivers all the freshness and forcefulness so typical of Yellow Label with a symphony of fruit tastes following on. Here is a true member of the powerful Brut family, well structured, admirably vinous. The lingering aromas echo and re-echo, with each fruit or spice note distinct.
- 4 Veuve Clicquot Rosé NV Champagne** £65.00
Delicious, red fruit-flavoured champagne from a legendary house. Supremely quaffable and likely to arouse romantic notions in even the hardest of hearts.

Whites

- 5 **Chablis, Vincent Dampit, Burgundy, France** £37.50
Stylish with delicate notes of lemon & textbook minerality. A 'rising star in the region' domaine crafting immaculately balanced boutique Chablis. It oozes that elegant, pure and mineral style of Chardonnay that defines Chablis.
- 6 **Pouilly-Fuisse, Moulin du Pont, Maison Auviogue, Burgundy, France** £42.50
The Auviogue family are well-known winemakers in the Maconnais region. Their Pouilly-Fuisse is a classic representative of the appellation, made from the fruit of their old vineyard Moulin du Pont. Beautifully judged ripeness of orchard & citrus fruits with a fine structure and acids.
- 7 **Pinot Gris, Eradus, Marlborough, New Zealand** £29.95
A charming 'food-friendly' PG that is produced in a more Alsation/marginally off-dry style. Rich and weighty, the wine is very flexible on a food match level and copes with complex seafood, cheese and egg dishes.
- 8 **Sancerre, Grande Maison, Chaumeau-Balland, Loire, France** £37.50
A delightful small, 10 ha. farm producing fine delicately balanced wines. The Sancerre possesses delicious fruit with classic minerality and herbaceous notes and bone-crushingly dry and finish. A fine expression of Loire Sauvignon.
- 9 **Montagny Bonneveaux, 1er Cru, Olivier Leflaive, Burgundy, France** £48.50
With its enticing jasmine scent, supple orchard fruit and lemon-cream layers, this wine beautifully expresses the bright slopes of its origin in the sunny Cote Chalonnaise.
- 10 **Chablis, Grand Cru, Bougros, Masison Dampit, Burgundy, France** £69.50
There is an expansive quality to this wine with its supple apple fruit, lifted by vanilla-cardamom spice and acacia honey, just exotic enough whilst an underlying acidity keeps the crème fraiche layers in check.
- 11 **Ana Sauvignon Blanc, Eradus, Marlborough, New Zealand** £29.95
Although the Eradus vineyards are situated in the Awatere Valley, most of the grapes that go into Ana are grown in the Wairau Plains, north of the Awatere topped up with juice from the younger vines of the Awatere fruit. This means the wine has all the flavour and minerality of the other Eradus wines but gives a more up-front, juicy style.
- 12 **Chassagne-Montrachet Domaine Bachelet-Ramonet, Burgundy, France** £59.50
Stylish Cote de Beaune Chardonnay from this small quantity of just four parcels of vines totaling 0.49 Ha. Fine citrus and floral aromas with lovely minerality and toast. The palate is reserved with great underlying structure.

Rosé

- 13 **Sancerre Rosé, Domaine Tissier, Loire, France** £38.50
The Tissier vineyards cover 11 hectares in the heart of Sancerre. Production is small, and the family aim to produce high quality Sancerres with floral aromas, freshness and mineral concentration. Appetising strawberry aromas and flavours of red summer fruits.

Reds

- 14 **Malbec, Chamuyo, Mendoza, Argentina** £29.00
A lovely, lush and rounded Malbec that with its simple yet chunky dark fruit flavours pretty much cries out for beef under all its' guises. The young, dynamic team behind Chamuyo believe in expressing the grape's gutsy, bright and fleshy fruit characters.

- 15 Cotes du Rhone, Vignobles Gonnet, Rhone, France** **£29.50**
Beautifully made slice of 'Rhône in a bottle' from innovative family winemakers, Vignobles Gonnet. The blend is equal parts Syrah, Grenache and Cinsaut producing a rustic yet well-structured and elegant wine layered with black fruit and spices.
- 16 Rioja, Crianza, Vina Belezos, Bodegas Zugober, Spain** **£29.50**
Stunning Crianza from one of the new stars of the region. Definitely in the traditional style of Rioja but with a delicious fragrant and fresh angle that has singled this Bodegas out for critical praise. Look at this as fabulous drinking comfortably positioned somewhere between Rioja, Burgundy and Bordeaux with all the appeal.
- 17 St. Emilion, Grand Cru, Ch. Barrail du Blanc, Bordeaux, France** **£42.50**
This tiny property, just 3 hectares, is situated in St Sulpice de Faleyrons on rather light, well-drained soils, 80% pure gravel with the rest a mix of gravel and sand. The wine is made by the 'Etablissements de J-P Mouiex' the current owners of Ch. Petrus. By virtue of the terroir here, this can never be a massively powerful wine – but so much the better. A blend of 70% Merlot and 30% Cabernet Franc, deep shimmering ruby in colour, this offers accessible dark, sweet fruit on the nose. The palate is rich, supple and succulent, dense, with a well-integrated structure and good length.
- 18 Valpolicella Ripasso Superiore, Cecilia Beretta, Veneto, Italy** **£35.50**
Valpolicella Ripasso is a wine that is in between the basic Valpolicella wine and the Amarone, sharing the freshness, the lightness and the value for money of basic Valpolicella wines, and some of the structures and flavours of the Amarone. It's a very flexible wine that can work well with lighter roast chicken and game dishes as well as fuller bodied beef and venison.
- 19 Medoc, Chateau St. Aubin, Bordeaux, France** **£36.00**
Interesting to see a Bordeaux chateau still using the traditional blend of the six permitted grapes. Approximately 41% Merlot, 12% Cabernet Sauvignon, 7% Cabernet Franc, 16% Petit Verdot, 17% Carmenère & 7% Malbec, this is very stylish wine bursting with rich, polished fruit, fine tannins and ripe length.
- 20 Châteauneuf-du-Pape Cuvee Tradition Vignobles Gonnet, Rhone, France** **£52.50**
The Gonnet family estate in Châteauneuf-du-Pape was developed by Etienne Gonnet in the 1950s. Run today by Etienne's sons, Jean and Michel Gonnet, the estate's quality credentials could not be more impressive: thirty hectares of vineyards running up to Le Crau (arguably the most revered vineyard plot in the entire Châteauneuf-du-Pape appellation); sunny south/south-east facing slopes; clay-limestone soils littered with prized, heat-reflecting galets roulés (pudding stones); and low-yielding 110-year-old vines. Fresh and aromatic bursting with velvety fruit with underlying muscle of the finish.

Dessert & Fortified Wines

(37.5cl Bottle)

- 21 Elysium Black Muscat, Quady Winery, Napa Valley, USA** **£29.50**
Black Muscat, known in Europe as the table grape variety, Muscat Hamburg, is one of the very few black skinned muscats. Ethereal rose-like aromas and lychee like flavours dominate this outstanding dessert wine and inspired the winery to name the wine Elysium, Greek for heaven. A firm favourite of ours, and perfect with chocolate & caramelised fruit dishes.
- 22 Sticky Mickey LH Sauvignon Blanc, Eradus, Marlborough, New Zealand** **£29.50**
An experimental LH Sauvignon (known as a 'sticky' in the southern hemisphere) that has grown arms and legs in the past couple of years ... Michiel 'Mickey' Eradus has been playing around with this wine for a few years now and has only now started to produce small amounts commercially. The grapes have been chosen from selected parcels in the vineyards and have been left on the vines to concentrate sugars and develop the complex fruit and herbaceous characters. "Hilariously named sweetie has the most raucous orange blossom notes on the nose and a slippery syrupy palate and I must admit that it won me over in a trice" Mathew Jukes, Daily Mail.
